Energy Efficiency Credits

Energy Efficiency Credits are available on electric motors, electric heating, electric hot water heaters, Energy Star appliances and LED lights. Efficiency Credits are available on new installations only.

Certain standards of efficiency must be met to qualify depending on the type of electric equipment installed.

Some of the credits from Tri–State G & T are:

*Electric water heaters - \$30 -\$100/unit

*Heat pumps \$125 - \$150/ton

*Electric motors 10-500 hp \$8/hp *2 Ton or larger Energy Star air

conditioners-\$100-\$150/unit *Energy Star Appliances (refrig, clothes or dish washer and clothes dryers) \$30-\$90

*LED lights - lesser of 1/2 cost of lights or \$8 per lamp

Safe – Efficient – Electric



Before use, learn about the potential dangers associated with portable generators, such as their production of carbon monoxide (CO). CO is an odorless, colorless, and tasteless poisonous gas that is often called the "silent killer" because it is virtually undetectable without the use of technology like CO alarms. Follow these tips to generate power AND safety when using a generator.

BY THE NUMBERS

AFRICAN AMERICANS accounted for 23% of fatalities, which is nearly **DOUBLE** their proportion of the U.S. population.

Storms account for many of the fatalities associated with generator use, with ICE/SNOW storms are accounting for 46%. HURRICANES accounted for 29%.

R	NEVER operate a generator INSIDE your home or in other enclosed or partially-enclosed spaces, including GARAGES. 	A generator is a TEMPORARY power source and should NEVER be used as a permanent solution.		Use only extension cords that have a THREE-PRONGED plug and are rated for the intended load.		Do NOT OVERLOAD the generator.
	NEVER connect generators directly to household wiring without first installing a TRANSFER SWITCH. This prevents backfeeding which could electrocute utility workers making repairs.		Your home generator should be installed by a QUALIFIED ELECTRICIAN and bear the mark of a nationally recognized testing laboratory, such as UL, Intertek or CSA.		The Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends generators be positioned at least 20 FEET from doors, windows and vents to prevent CO from entering the home.

When it comes to paying your electric bill each month, Chimney Rock PPD offers many choices. Choose the one that works best for you.

Automatic payment from your checking or savings account

You can have your monthly electric bill payment automatically transferred from your checking or savings account to pay your electric bill. Payments are made around the 6th of each month. You will continue to receive a monthly statement from CRPPD. To enroll an authorization form must be filled out giving CRPPD permission to withdraw funds from your checking or savings account. The form can be found online at our website or you can call our office to receive the form.

Online bill pay

Sign up to securely pay your bill online by visiting our website at www.crppd.com. Take advantage of the free, convenient, secure and easy-to-use option, click on the *Bill Pay* box on the home page. Login or register, if it is your first time you will need to use your meter number and create a password. The system allows more than one meter number to be set up on your account if needed.

Credit/debit card or echeck

Contact our office to set up your account on recurring payment of your bill using a credit/debit card or your checking account information. Automatic payments will be made around the 6th of each month.

Check or cash

As always, we accept checks or cash to pay your monthly bill. Payments can be dropped by our office as we have a drop box located at our office for your convenience.

Bills are due by the bill date listed on your bill. Pay your bill by that date in order to avoid any loss of discount or interest charges.

Chicken Enchiladas

1 tablespoon butter 1/2 cup chopped green onions

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1 can diced green chiles 1 can cream of mushroom soup

1/2 cup sour cream
1 1/2 cups cubed cooked chicken breast meat
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
6 (12") flour tortillas
1/4 cup milk

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a large baking dish.

In a medium saucepan over medium heat. melt butter and saute the green onions until tender (3-4 minutes). Add the garlic powder, stir in the green chiles, cream of mushroom soup, and sour cream. Mix well. Reserve 3/4 of this sauce and set aside. To the remaining 1/4 of sauce in the saucepan. add the chicken and 1/2 cup of shredded Cheddar cheese. Stir together. Fill each tortilla with the chicken mixture and roll up. Place seam side down in the baking dish.

In a small bowl combine the reserved 3/4 of the sauce with the milk. Spoon this mixture over the rolled tortillas and top with the remaining 1/2 cup of cheese. Bake for 30-35 minutes.
