#### Energy Efficiency Credits

Energy Efficiency Credits are available on electric motors, electric heating, electric hot water heaters, Energy Star appliances and LED lights. Efficiency Credits are available on new installations only.

Certain standards of efficiency must be met to qualify depending on the type of electric equipment installed.

Some of the credits from Tri–State G & T are:

- \*Electric water heaters \$30 \$100/unit
- \*Heat pumps \$125 \$150/ton
- \*Electric motors 10-500 hp \$8/hp
- \*2 Ton or larger Energy Star air conditioners-\$100-\$150/unit
- \*Energy Star Appliances (refrig, clothes or dish washer and clothes dryers) \$30-\$90
- \*LED lights lesser of 1/2 cost of lights or \$8 per lamp

Chimney Rock also contributes to some of the credit.


Within a typical U.S. household, heating and cooling accounts for about 43 percent of the energy bill according to the Energy Information Administration. Up to 20 percent of energy use goes to heating water for things like showers and laundry. Appliances represent the third-largest energy spend, at 9 percent of your energy bill. Specifically, refrigerators and clothes dryers typically have the highest operating costs per year. New washing machines that bear the Energy Star label use 25 percent less energy and about 70 to 75 percent less water than agitator washers did 20 years ago, according to Energy Star.

If you're not in the market for a new washer, getting smart about how you wash your clothes can go a long way. Waiting until you have a full load, ramping up the washer's spin speed, and cleaning the dryer's lint filter are just a few of the expert tips we've collected on how to save energy while doing your laundry.

#### Plan Ahead to Call Before You Dig

Digging without locating underground utilities, even the smallest digging projects, could leave neighborhoods in the dark, cause thousands of dollars in damages, or cause severe electrical shock. To help stay safe, make use of the national underground utility locating service for free by calling 811.

The 811 "Call Before You Dig" number will route you to your local utility locating service. Make sure to tell the operator where and when you plan to dig and what type of work you will be doing. From there, it takes a few business days for a professional to come mark your public utilities with flags or spray paint. So make sure to plan ahead and call in advance.

There are different colors of paint and flags that mark the underground utilities, and each color is universal to what utility is buried.

- Red Electric
- Orange Communications, Telephone/CATV
- Blue Potable Water
- Green Sewer/Drainage
- Yellow Gas/Petroleum Pipe Line
- Purple Reclaimed Water
- White Premark site of intended excavation

Even if you previously had utilities located by calling 811, it is best to call before every digging project. Underground utilities can shift, and it is important to be certain of where they are before ever putting a shovel in the ground.

It is important to understand that 811 locators do not locate privately installed facilities. If you have any private utilities, you will need to hire a private utility locator. Some examples of private utilities include: underground sprinkler system, invisible fences, data communication systems, private water systems, or gas piping to a garage.

Once all of your underground utilities have been located, it is time to start digging, but be sure to wear all of the proper protective gear before putting the shovel into the earth.



#### Farmhouse Apple Coleslaw

4 cups shredded cabbage
1 large apple, chopped
3/4 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon sugar
1 tablespoon olive oil
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

In serving bowl, combine the cabbage, apple, raisins, celery, and onion. In a small bowl, combine the remaining ingredients. Pour over cabbage mixture and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.
