The first week of October is Customer Service Week and we at Chimney Rock strive to give the best service available every day and any time there is a problem. Also, on the 1<sup>st</sup> is International Coffee Day which is the perfect time as it is also National Homemade Cookie Day, on the 4<sup>th</sup> is National Golf Day which may be a little late in Nebraska but you never know about the weather here. The 5<sup>th</sup> is Do Something Nice Day and World Teachers' Day (it would be nice to do something nice for a teacher). On the 9<sup>th</sup> is Fire Prevention Day and on the 12<sup>th</sup> is Old Farmer's Day (something we all appreciate) the 14<sup>th</sup> is National Dessert Day, but we have to wait until the 21<sup>st</sup> for National Pumpkin Cheesecake Day. The 24<sup>th</sup> is Mother-in-Law Day then on the 29<sup>th</sup> is Frankenstein Friday and National Frankenstein Day and on the 31st is National Carve a Pumpkin Day and Halloween. Have a good harvest and October, be safe and enjoy the great fall weather as all too soon the cold and snow will be here.

### Farmers: Increase Your Safety Yield During Harvest

During harvest we would like to remind our farmers that along with more obvious farming risks, accidents related to power and electricity are also possible. Take the following steps to decrease the chances of an electrical-related incident:

- Always use a spotter when operating large machinery near lines.
- Use care when raising augers or the bed of grain trucks around power lines.
- Keep equipment at least 10 feet from lines at all times, in all directions.
- Inspect the height of the farm equipment to determine clearance.
- Always lower extensions to the lowest setting when moving loads.
- Never attempt to move a power line out of the way or raise it for clearance.
- If a power line is sagging or low, call your local utility right away.
- If your equipment does hit a power line, do not leave the cab. Immediately call 9-1-1, warn others to stay away, and wait for the utility crew to cut the power.

### Energy Efficiency Credits

Energy Efficiency Credits are available on electric motors, electric heating, electric hot water heaters, Energy Star appliances and LED lights. Must be new installations only and submitted withing 120 days.

Certain standards of efficiency must be met to qualify depending on the type of electric equipment installed.

Some of the credits include:

\*Electric water heaters - \$30 -\$100/unit

\*Heat pumps-\$300-\$500/ton 15 SEER Minimum

\*Electric motors 10-500 hp \$8/hp

\*2 Ton or larger Energy Star air conditioners-\$100-\$150/unit

\*Energy Star Appliances (refrig, freezer, clothes or dish washer and clothes dryers) \$30-\$90

\*LED lights - lesser of 1/2 cost of lights or \$8 per lamp, 500 Lumens or greater

\*Electric trimmer, chainsaw, or pruner, electric blower or lawnmower - 25% of cost, up to \$100

Receipts are generally required. Chimney Rock also contributes to some of the credit.

### Public Power Week - October 3-9, 2021

In the early twentieth century, electricity was a scarce commodity. Investor-owned utilities found that it was not economically feasible to provide electric service to rural areas. Recognizing that, Nebraska's U.S. Senator, George Norris, led the way to pass the Rural Electrification Act (REA). This legislation enabled the creation of publicly owned power generation and delivery systems for the common good.

Public power utilities are:

- \* Nebraska is the only state in America totally served by a consumer-owned public power system delivering electricity as a non-profit service.
- \* In Nebraska, public power offers reliable, efficient, friendly service.
- \* Community-owned
- \* Locally controlled

Summer is fading, fall is in the air, and harvest is underway. Soon it will be time to fence the corn stalks for livestock and winter will be closing in. Just a reminder for the folks out there that are

running livestock on corn stalks, please be sure to fence out the electric poles-especially the meter pole! Cattle seem to like rubbing on meter sockets and disconnects, causing damage to equipment and danger to livestock and people.



 box yellow cake mix
can (15 oz) pure pumpkin puree
can (12 oz) evaporated milk
large eggs
1/2 cups sugar
tsp. cinnamon
tsp. salt
1/2 cups chopped pecans
cup butter, melted

Heat oven to 350 degrees and grease bottom of 9x13 pan. Mix pumpkin, milk, eggs, sugar, cinnamon and salt, and pour in bottom of prepared dish.

Sprinkle package of cake mix over pumpkin mixture. Do not mix or stir, you want this in layers. Top with pecans, then add melted butter.

Bake it for 50-55 minutes. Serve warm with whipped topping, refrigerate what is left over.

Old, uninsulated and improperly installed exterior doors can waste energy and money.

Shut the door on wasted energy by weather stripping and sealing all exterior doors. If you have an old exterior door, consider replacing it with a newer, energy efficient model.
